TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

On a summer day, with the windows open, we may hear the sound of church bells. Bells seem to have come into church life in Irish monasteries around the seventh century, and spread around the Christian world by Irish monks on missionary journeys. By the eighth century, bells were standard equipment in even small parish churches. An ancient ceremony, once called the "baptism of the bells," recognizes that the church bell has a voice to call people to awareness and summon them to worship, and even bestows a name on the bell.

In a world without clocks or watches, the bell had an indispensable role. For calling monks in from the fields for prayer, or alerting far2flung visitors, the bell's voice was enhanced by hoisting it high into a tower. Soon it was learned that the sound of several bells clanging together in harmony imparted a sense of joy to great celebrations, and bell towers prospered, some chock full of bells. Different combinations of rings could indicate a death, a Mass, a wedding, a fast day, the curfew at the end of day, and the Angelus. Before electricity, bell-ringing was hard work indeed: the biggest bell in the Catholic world, in Cologne, Germany, weighs twenty2seven tons! There's no substitute for the resonant roar of a mighty bell; electric chimes are not eligible for blessing!

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK "Fr. Steve"

"Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" is the first question Jesus is asked in today's Gospel. Moses tells the people in the First Reading that they don't have to search far for an answer: it is "already in your mouths and in your hearts, you have only to carry it out." The answer is in the command of God quoted by the scholar of the law in today's Gospel: "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself." This leads to a second question for Jesus: "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus answers by telling the story of the Good Samaritan which is a shock to his listeners as the people of Israel looked down on the Samaritans at that time. Jesus calls us to look on every human being as our neighbor and to love with a compassion that is shown in action. St. Paul tells us in the Second Reading today that through the blood of his Cross Jesus makes peace for us and between us. In Jesus we can live God's law of love and come to fullness of life.

* We are blessed with the presence of Fr. Liam O'Connell, S.J., the cousin of Fr. Maurice O'Mahony, Pastor Emeritus. Father Liam has come to serve at Mount Carmel each summer for the last fifteen years. He will be with us until July 29th.

* Father Steve, our Pastor, is away on his annual vacation. He will return to Our Lady of Mount Carmel on July 30th.

* Repairs and improvements at Mount Carmel Church and School are more limited than the last two summers. So far, the main sewer line serving the Church, Rectory and school have been replaced at a cost of \$12,237. A new urinal has been installed in the men's rest room at the Parish Hall at a cost of \$843 and a hot water heater has been installed in the Church Sacristy at a cost of \$760. Repairs are being made to the school windows on the west side of the school and new dead bolt locks will be installed on all classroom doors - these expenses will be School expenses. Every effort is being made to reduce expenses so the Church does not have an operating deficit this year.

* Archbishop Jose Gomez, Archbishop of Los Angeles, has asked all Catholics to immediately contact your California Assembly members and urge them to vote "no" on Senate Bill 131. Simply tell your representatives to vote "no" because this legislation puts the social services and educational work of the Church at risk and unjustly discriminates against Catholic schools and other private employers. The Bishops of the California Catholic Conference believe it is urgent for Catholics to act now.
