Toving God and Others

In today's gospel story, Jesus uses a coin to teach a lesson. The people asked if it was right to pay taxes to the government. They wanted to know who is more important, God or the government. Jesus took a coin and asked whose picture was on it. It was Caesar, the Roman leader. Jesus said, "Give to Caesar what is Caesar's, but give to God what is God's."

Jesus meant that we should obey the laws of our government as long as they are not against the laws of God.

The government makes laws to protect and help the people. The schools make laws that help you to learn. The leaders of your town make laws to keep you safe and make your community beautiful. These are good laws, and God wants us to obey them.








Be the Best that You Can Be

God does not want you to bury your talent and never use it.


God wants you to be the very best YOU in all the world.








Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe (A) • Matthew 25:31-46 • November 22, 2020







Jesus is not that kind of a king. Sometimes our King dresses in rags, sometimes he is cold and hungry, and sometimes he is very lonely. He doesn't live in a palace with guards and high walls. He lives in the hearts of his people, especially those who need his love the most.

Jesus says, "Whatever you do for my brothers and sisters, you also do for me." That's the secret of Jesus' Kingdom. If you want to serve Jesus, you must learn to serve others.
